She was quoted as saying, Ŵ "My son's behaviour made me think he'd spend the rest of his life in jail!". As a child Sylvester did everything wrong. He'd jump out of four Ŵ storey buildings, landing in the bushes. He did what he wanted and he According to his mother when he was about three he was fearless. had a little bike and would peddle it around the block. While that P.1 sounds innocent enough he liked to stand on the seat of his bike and set Ŵ off a nearby fire alarm so that he could see the fire trucks come

screaming down the street. His mother was fined for this several times. If he ever got bored with the TV he used to wee into the power point which would consequently blow all the fuses. Mrs Stallone described her son as mischievous, overactive and very unpredictable. By the time Sylvester was 16 he had been thrown out of 17 high schools and could not write or spell and had even Ŵ failed gym. According to Sylvester the



best advice that his mother gave him was "Don't look back, keep looking ahead and try and try until you get it right." Ŵ

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Right now, the chancellor George Osborne is deciding whether to carry on cutting care for older and disabled people, or whether to give it the funding it deserves.

Shocking figures show that government spending in this area has gone down 20% in the past three years, even though many more people need care. [1] In less than a week's time, Osborne will set out the government's spending plans for 2015/16. He's making the final decisions now. Older and disabled people need funding for more carers and more care, not less. We need to let him know he won't get away with making cuts that affect the people who are the most vulnerable.

Carers provide basic support - but often they're the difference between living and just existing. From helping people out of bed in the morning, to taking them to see friends or eat a meal - for many receiving care, it's their main source of human contact.

George Osborne just doesn't seem to understand the difference good care makes - not just to people's lives but to the NHS. Experts have shown that many of those stuck in hospital beds don't need to be there and, if they'd had the right care at home, they wouldn't be. [2]

George Osborne would love the spending review to pass without controversy. A massive petition calling on him to increase funding for older and disabled people is the sort of attention he'd rather avoid. If we shine a light on him, we can make sure he's seen as a failure if he doesn't commit more money to care.
